SESSION DESCRIPTION

Supporting Deaf Culture In the Public School Classroom: The Interpreter's Role

Two languages, two cultures. Deaf children experience life in a myriad of cultural interactions during the school day. This session provides a review of components of Deaf Culture that can be supported in the public schools, using lecture, discussion, role play and other activities. Special attention is focused on the educational interpreter's role in cultural transmission and cultural mediation.

- Define culture as a social construct and list four major components of deaf culture
- List three culturally appropriate activities that can be incorporated into a communications media lesson
- Describe two cultural mediation strategies that can be used in the regular education setting
